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This 28-year-old project weaves a crosshatched path in multiple directions between performance art, theater, civil war narratives, cultural studies, human rights, and all manners of political activism across the globe. Struck by the Jewish Holocaust, other genocides and wars in Europe, Asia, Africa, EE.UU., and Latin America, and by how visually rich those conflicts are, this project developed a methodology to record artistic and intellectual reactions to those human debacles and fractured memories, turning them into non-ephemeral resistance images, increasing the possibilities of an artistic language, and providing a fuller expression and understanding of complex Human Rights violations.

*ALLISON, Kirk (USA). A former University of Minnesota faculty member, he teaches at the College of Saint Scholastica, and is a Voice to Vision Associate Director. He directed the Program in Human Rights and Health at the Univ. of Minnesota School of Public Health. He published *Cada uno cuenta: patógenos y políticas en la pandemia de COVID-19* (2020) and *Cases abusing brain death definition in organ procurement in China* (2022).

*AÑÓN SUÁREZ, Carolina (ARGENTINA) is Assistant Professor at the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures at Fairfield University. A co-editor of *Generación Hijes: memoria, posdictadura y posconflicto en América Latina* (2023). A Ph.D. from the U. of Minnesota. her dissertation studies memory narratives of the post-dictatorship generation in Argentina.

*ARIZA FLOREZ, Patricia (COLOMBIA). Director of the *Corporación Colombiana de teatro*, and a founder of the *Teatro La Candelaria*, she promotes social interaction, advocating for permanent peace. ***ECHAVEZ-SOLANO, Nelsy (COLOMBIA-USA).** A Hispanic Linguistics Ph.D. at U of Minnesota, *she* is a Professor at *College of St. Benedict / St. John's University.* A Co-Director of *The State of Iberoamerican Studies Series*; and Associate Editor of *Hispanic Issues, she* has published with Kenya Dworkin, *Spanish and Empire (2007);* with Luis A. Ramos-García and Beatriz Rizk, *Panorama de las artes escénicas ibérico y latinoamericanas (2007);* with Beatriz Rizk, *Paradigmas recientes en las artes escénicas Latinas y latinoamericanas (2010),* book that received the prestigious "Argentina's Theater of the World Award," and *La lengua del Palenque /Lengua ri Palenge: Inventario léxico (2014).*

***ENCINAS CARRANZA, Percy (PERU)**. Professor of theory and theater at the Univ. Nacional de San Marcos, and a Ph.D. candidate at the Universidad de Buenos Aires. He directed the UCSUR International Theater Festival, developing theater studies curricula for the UCSUR, and the ENSAD. He directs the Festival Internacional de saberes escénicos, and the Asociación Iberoamericana de Artes y Letras. A journalist, theater/literature researcher, he received the "2018 Premio Estímulo Económico del Ministerio de Cultura." An international lecturer, he has contributed to Gestos, Conjunto, Teatros (Colombia), and Mostra Latinoamericana (Brazil). His play Necrópolis received the "2018 British Theater at Perú Award."

*FEINBERG, David (USA). A U of Minnesota Emeritus Professor, he founded *Voice to Vision*, a collaborative art project that features video documentaries that record the process of survivors and witnesses of genocide and human rights abuses from all continents. His art works have been displayed nationally and internationally since 2003. He donated 96 + artworks to the University of Minnesota *Center of Holocaust and Genocide Studies*: see https://conservancy.umn.edu/handle/11299/163988. He has degrees from Parsons School of Design, New York State University, and Cranbrook Academy of Art. He received the C.E.E. Distinguished Teacher of the Year Award; the Board of Regents Outstanding Community Service Award; the President's Multicultural Grant, the Grand Challenges Research Project; and the Office of Public Engagement ACTION Grant.

***FORCINITO, ANA (ARGENTINA).** A University of Pittsburgh Ph.D. and a 20th-21st century Latin American literature and film researcher, she received the Arsham and Charlotte Ohanessian Chair; the 2018 Casa de las Américas Award for Óyeme con los ojos; the 2018-2020 Interdisciplinary Collaborative Workshop Award; and the 2018 Institute of Advanced Study Research Award. Specialist on interdisciplinary approaches to testimonial narratives, visual studies, memory studies, and feminist theory, she published *Los umbrales del testimonio: entre las narraciones de los sobrevivientes y las marcas de la posdictadura* (2012); *Intermittences: Memory, Justice and the Poetics of the Visible* (2018); & Hear me with your Eyes (2022).

*GALICIA, Rocío (MEXICO). A Ph.D. Candidate at Universidad Iberoamericana, and UNAM, México (Dramatic Literature and Theater), she researches at the "Centro Nacional de Investigación Teatral Rodolfo Usigli," coordinating the project, "Bodies, frontiers and violences." Her recent books are: *Casi muerte, casi vida. Manifestaciones teatrales en la frontera norte de México* (2011); and *Dramaturgias fronterizas* (2018). A professor of Arts, Letters and History, she is a member of the Editorial Board of *Anagnórisis*, the *Red de Estudios de Artes Escénicas Latinoamericanas*; and the Literary Managers and Dramaturgs of Americas, México. *GARCIA, Catalina (COLOMBIA). A *Radio Cadena Nacional Televisión* (Colombia) conceptual editor, she graduated (Art History) at City and East London College, England. She has been working for thirty years for audiovisual media projects in Colombia. A script and movie assistant director, she worked with movie directors Libia Stella Gómez; and Sergio Cabrera. She has received two *India Catalina* awards as the best TV editor for the series *El Joe y Garzón vive*. She has participated in more than thirty TV productions, several of them included in the IMDb internet site.

*GARCIA, Cindy (USA). University of Minnesota Associate Professor, Theatre Arts and Dance, she teaches dance, cultural studies theory, and performance ethnography. She has created and edited a new decolonial feminist publication, *Contours: Arts. Activism. Pathways* published online by the U. of M. Library. This publication launches the Contours Project's focus on transnational community engaged research and relationship-building in the Americas. A J.D. *cum laude* from the U. of Minnesota Law School and serves on the senior leadership team at *The Advocates for Human Rights*, where she heads up the organization's research, education, and advocacy team and leads communication strategy. She has served on the national leadership team of the Immigration Advocates Network. the Minnesota Coalition Against Sexual Assault public policy committee, the Minnesota Human Trafficking Task Force, and as chair of Detention Watch Network. Member of the American Immigration Lawyers Association, she practices Law, and works as an adjunct clinical faculty member of Mitchell Hamline College of Law and the U of M Law School.

*GÓMEZ, Osiris Aníbal (MEXICO-USA). A Ph.D. in Hispanic Languages and Literatures from the U. of California, Santa Barbara, he is Assistant Professor at the U. of M. where he teaches Indigenous literature and philosophy, Mexican cinema, and literature through decolonial perspectives and methodologies. An expert in contemporary Mexican bilingual Indigenous literature, he founded the *Writers and Scholars in Indigenous Languages and Literatures International Conference* (2018).

*JUSTINIANO, Alberto (USA). A Director of *Teatro del Pueblo*, and co-director of *The State of Iberoamerican Studies Series*, and Latino/Asian Fusion series, he is an independent active director, playwright, screenwriter, and producer for both film and theater. He directed several short PBS films made for national TV, focusing on educating the public about multi-cultural themes. He received the Minneapolis-Saint Paul Companies Leadership in the Arts Award and Fellowship; and the Target Community Award (2012). He was the director for *West Side Story* and *On the Heights*, theater productions staged in Minnesota.

KOSS, María Natacha (ARGENTINA). A Ph.D. candidate, *Universidad de Buenos Aires*, she teaches Theater History at UBA. An Academic Secretary at the *Instituto de Artes del Espectáculo*, and artistic director and researcher of the *Centro Cultural de la Cooperación*, her latest books are *Historia del teatro*. Volumen 1" (2021); *Mitos y territorios teatrales* in Editorial Argus-a California (2021); *Cuerpo, convivio y pandemia. En la cultura y las artes* (2022); and *Dimes grotescos, Diretes exquisitos* (2023). She directs the *UBACyT project* "Imaginarios y humor grotesco. Teatralidades europeas y Primera Guerra Mundial." A Summer Mapuche Language and Culture Fellowship from University of Texas, her "Territories for disobedience as constituents of subjectivity in *El sistema del tacto*, by Alejandra Costamagna" appeared in *Hispanic Issues* online (2023).

*QUINTERO, Diana. (COLOMBIA) is a senior fellow at the *Humphrey School of Public Affairs*. A visiting human rights engaged scholar (U of M Human Rights program), she has over 20 years of experience teaching and researching socio-economic rights and international human rights law. As a practitioner, she has provided advice and legal representation to indigenous communities, displaced populations, and communities at risk. An adviser for the Constitutional Court, especially on the right to health, she has served as a consultant for NGOs promoting women's sexual and reproductive rights.

He is a member of *Voice to Vision*, a Center for Holocaust and Genocide Studies project.

***Rasmussen, Kaylee (US)** is a Ph.D. student in the U of Minnesota Spanish & Portuguese Studies. M.A. in Spanish from the University of Loyola Chicago. She has been a professional ballroom dancer and instructor for 12 years. Her research areas include Latin American literature, dance, and theater.

***RIZK, Beatriz (COLOMBIA-US).** Educational Director of the Miami International Hispanic Theatre Festival and a member of Teatro Avante, she has published essays on Latina/o/x and Latin American theatre in the Americas and Europe. Her recent books are, *Posmodernismo y teatro en América Latina: Teorías y prácticas en el umbral del siglo XXI* (2001); *Teatro y diáspora. Testimonios escénicos latinoamericanos* (2002); and *Imaginando un Continente: Utopía, democracia y neoliberalismo en el teatro latinoamericano* (2010). Her latest book is *A History of Latinx Performing Arts in the U.S.*, Vol. I and II (2023).

***SHAHRIAR**, **Sima (IRAN).** An accomplish artist, writer, and activist, Sima is a member of *Voice to Vision*, and her *Sima Sharhriar: I am a bridge* art installation (2018) is at the University of Minnesota Center for the Holocaust and genocide Studies. Her "Spirit of Peace," dedicated to Jhina (Mahsa) Amini, killed in 2022 by the brutality of the morality police in Tehran sheds lights on the tribulations of Iranian women silenced by an oppressive government.

***VAZQUEZ**, **Ángel** (**PUERTO RICO**) is an experienced actor, playwright, and director. He is the most active actor in the USA Universities circuit, specializing in social themes, e.g.: *Puertorro University* (Education), and *Macho Menos* (Domestic Violence),

***VIESTENZ, William (US).** Spanish and Portuguese Studies Chair, and professor at the Institute for Global Studies U. of M., he has a Ph.D. from Stanford University in Iberian and Latin American Cultures, placing an emphasis on the intersection of Catalan Studies and political theory.
